
Context for Today's Call

School Wellness in Maryland: Structure of School Health Councils





 - CDC CTG and **NOPREN**-funded (now Maryland State Department of Education)



Maryland State School Health Council A bit of digging... What does the statute say?

- "formally reorganized in 1966"
- Purpose:
 - "to <u>assist in the development and maintenance</u> of school health programs and <u>promote</u> effective and comprehensive school health programs.
 - "The Council <u>studies, plans, and recommends action</u> aimed at the identification of health needs and remediation of health programs of school age children, and it <u>serves as a</u> <u>forum</u> for the Department of Education and Department of Health, their local counterparts, and other groups concerned with the health of school age children."

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Maryland State School Health Council

Accomplishments: 2018-2019 School Year

- New officers ("Executive Committee"; 3-year term)
 - Chair + Two Vice Chairs (3 individuals representing MSDE, MDH, and outside agency) + secretary/treasurer
- Executive Board Membership



Wellness Teams

- Strong scientific evidence: wellness teams support wellness policy implementation
- Recommended by federal government agencies and school wellness organizations
- Can be mandated by school systems via Local Wellness Policies
- 2016-2017 School Year: 55% of Maryland Schools had a Wellness
 - **Team** (MD Wellness Policies and Practices Project Survey)
 - 2018-2019 data coming soon!



Wellness Teams Work A Guide for Putting Wellness Policies into Practice in School

What is a school wellness team

A school wellness team is a committee that supports schools in the implementation of policies and programs that aim to improve student health.

Wellness policies and the role of school wellness teams

Wellness policies are written documents that outline a school district's vision for supporting student health (see Figure 1 for examples of wellness policy topics). An effective wellness policy can improve food choices, dietary intake, and physical activity for children in schools. However, to be effective, a wellness policy must be implemented, monitored, and assessed. A growing body of research indicates that school wellness teams are leav to putting wellness policies into practice in schools¹³ This research brief summarizes the evidence supporting the importance of active school wellness teams in promoting wellness policy implementation in schools.



Funding

Maryland State School Health Council \$5,000 from the State Department of Health

Local School Health Councils (24 school systems)

Variable: System-level funding, grantfunding, volunteer

School-Based Wellness Teams (~1400 schools) Variable: System-level funding (Title IV, system budget, club/sports stipend, grant-funding, volunteer, etc.

Summary

- Maryland State School Health Council aims to support local school health councils
- Locals School Health Councils
 - Vary by school system
 - Encouraged to visit a partner school system's meeting
- School-based wellness teams are a recommended approach to supporting wellness policy implementation





- Access to healthy foods and beverages
